My dear Friends,

Calm — a great calm, has spread its restful lull across the Parish. "Doesn't it feel strange?" has momentarily taken the place of "Cold (or nice) isn't it?" as a greeting.

It is months ago that three ladies sat by a long, white covered table, on which stood a tin of beans, one cake (soap) and a little cylinder of gums (sweets). They (on the table) were last survivors of a "bring and buy" stall at a Coffee Evening.

Then it happened — the voice of one of the ladies proclaimed

"I think we ought to have a bazaar!" and from that moment until last night more and more members of our congregation have hurled themselves into the storm. All have pulled their weight but many of the leaders have pulled a great deal more. The "home-work" done by some of the individual stall holders was almost as ruinous to their health as that of a modern Vith form girl in June.

The "general" meetings were better attended than our previous ones. The usual debates as to all the original ideas that would make this bazaar different came up for discussion. The Chairman cried "Order please" — that was his part of the fun and everyone else had their "say." It didn't really take long as nearly all spoke at the same time and nobody listened except the person on the next chair when he or she had to stop for breath but, what did it matter when every speaker was also a worker. After all the lady who suggested the bazaar in the first place had added "It would bring us all together again" and the meetings were just what she meant by those words. And after the meeting was over we found we had decided to do away with such old ideas as having a bazaar after all. We would have a "Fayre." And the next day, those of us who walked down Church Street realized that our good old friends at St. Mary's had blocked the view of their Church with a board on which was beautifully painted an invitation to their "FAYRE."

Nevertheless ours was the first one we've had from which no one could go and say (not particularly about ours) that at bazaars one always expected to pay more than lots of the stuff was worth.

Some of our workers have spent weeks and weeks in rehearsing a Christmas Play which was beautifully produced and

acted by our children. One felt that the producers had in mind Mr. Gillie Potter's monologue in which the proprietor of a hotel put on a guest's bill 10/6 to which the guest objected—

“What's that for?”

“For kissing my wife”

“I never kissed your wife”

“No, but she was there if you wanted to.”

So with this play. It was there for anyone who wished to see it and nobody—no matter what they got from the stalls—could sit there and watch the play and go away saying that they had not had their money's worth.

And all who helped in any wholehearted way in any capacity can sit back to-day and know they have each done a grand job for a grand cause. Let us all remember that we could not have done our bit without the help of all the others and all the leaders of the different sections (whom we all know and thank so especially) know that they couldn't have done without their helpers, right through to the little girl who presented the bouquet.

Details of the Fayre, so far as possible at this stage, will be found elsewhere in the magazine.

Now I must wish you all a very well earned Merry Christmas and Happy New Year. I trust I shall see every Confirmed member of our Church at Christmas at the mid-night service or later.

So shall we come to the close of another year, a year that has not been one of constant pleasure sailing over a glassy sea but one which has tested us all. Let us thank God for His guidance and lift up our hearts to Him and bravely sail on into 1959 with more determination and faith and trust in Him.
